

MASTER OF ARTS IN COMMUNITY MUSIC AT JUDSON UNIVERSITY





Are you interested in exploring:

- a service-oriented vocation which integrates music with faith?
- a new outlet as an audience-focused solo or ensemble artist?
- a communal place to teach participatory, therapeutic music?
- leadership that relates music to diversity and social justice?
- a meaningful path to utilize technologybased music production?

Judson University's Master of Arts in Community Music (MACM) is a groundbreaking program with a balanced focus on both academic work and community-service activities. The program is grounded in transformative perspectives on music performance, teaching, and production. Students will be trained to nurture various community groups with culturally relevant music activities and provide vital changes in the community.

The MACM program targets those with little or no formal musical education through local avenues like schools, senior communities, libraries, and churches, including underrepresented people like the incarcerated, those with disabilities, various ethnic groups, and more.



The program offers three different tracks: Artist-Teacher, Community Music Leader, and Music Producer. While all three tracks require students to take core subjects including community music courses, applied music instruction, research courses, and a recital presentation, each track has its own emphasis and thus pursues slightly different career paths. The Artist-Teacher track concentrates on performance-related classes, the Community Music Leader track focuses on developing organizational leadership skills, and the Music Producer track is designed for audio recording engineers and producers who desire to use their technology-based skills for community music development.

Graduates of the MA in Community Music program will be able to accomplish one or more of the below goals:

- Teach at community music schools, senior communities, churches, and other community groups.
- Be a creative ensemble leader and performer for diverse communities.
- Be a music entrepreneur who consistently produces new music for audiences in the community.
- Work as creative administrative staff in a music program at an arts organization, government agency, school, or community group.

SCHEDULE and COURSES

Students can enroll in classes either face-to-face or online. Coursework is designed to be completed within four to eight semesters.

CORE COURSES

Community Music: Meaning and Practice (**MUS 540**) introduces community music leadership as a service-focused vocation which embraces well-being, cultural diversity, and social justice. Students will create music classes for diverse community groups in conjunction with the Instructional Methods for Community Music course.

Instructional Methods for Community Music

(MUS 550) explores the evolution of group music instruction and examines types of music methods in current practice. Students will practice their teaching skills using selected methods for various instruments.

Global Music Education Across Cultures

(MUS 551) discusses relationships between music, culture, humanity, and global citizenship. Students will create music classes for diverse cultures and be encouraged to practice them in partnership with Judson University's Global Outreach mission teams or communitybased cultural organizations.

Community Music: Technology and Entrepreneurship (MUS 640) empowers students with skills for digital music production and provides ideas on how to transform their music into a profitable enterprise.

RESEARCH COURSES

Methods for Music Research (MUS 520) guides students through various strategies, procedures, and techniques of music research.

Individual Topics of Research (MUS 620)

guides students to find their own topics of research and collect data or evidence for analysis.

Graduate Research Project (MUS 621)

is built upon comprehensive knowledge accumulated from the two preceding research courses. Students will write a research paper that interprets and improves community music activities.







APPLIED MUSIC COURSES

Professional Apprenticeship (MUS 510-511) is an applied music course that offers private lessons in students' chosen instruments/ voice.

Ensemble Leadership and Management (MUS 560-561) is designed to train students as skilled leaders of music ensembles. In the process of planning, practicing, and promoting ensembles, students will develop creativity and insight to manage sustainable ensembles.

COURSES for INDIVIDUAL TRACKS

Performance Forum (MUS 530-531) equips students as confident storytellers who can explain ideas and purposes of their performances. For the Artist-Teacher track only.

Professional Apprenticeship (MUS 610-611) is an applied music course that offers private lessons in students' chosen instruments/ voice. For the Artist-Teacher track only.

Internship in Community Organization/Church (MUS 630) provides an opportunity to develop more hands-on experiences, receive professional mentorship, make connections, and build administrative skills at a community organization or a church. For the Community Music Leader track only.



Interpersonal Relations and Leadership Development (MHC 512) or Human Growth and Lifespan Development (MHC 510) sharpens students' essential skills required of leaders in human service organizations or understanding of lifelong human growth for optimal well-being. For the Community Music Leader track only.

Dark Horse Certificate (MUS 670) is a unique program held at the Dark Horse Institute (Nashville, TN). Students will obtain professional skills in audio engineering and music production. For the Music Producer track only.

A CAPSTONE COURSE

Graduate Recital Preparation (MUS 615) is the culmination of community music studies. Students will prepare an innovative, audience-friendly solo or ensemble recital program combined with storytelling, drama, multimedia, drawing, or other creative art forms for the community.

APPLICANTS

- BM or BA is required. Students without an undergraduate degree in music will audition and take undergraduate classes in music theory prior to acceptance into the program. (These courses may be taken at Judson University or transferred from another accredited institution.)
- International students require a minimum score of TOEFL 80 or DET (Duolingo English Test) 105.


